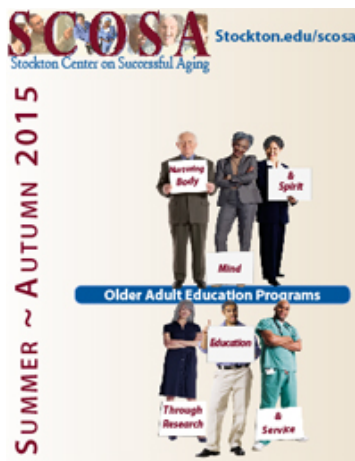

This year's Hesburgh Lecture offered by SCOSA in collaboration with the Notre Dame Club of South Jersey and the University of Notre Dame Alumni Association will feature Dr. Kwan S. Kim, Ph.D. Professor Emeritus of Economics; Fellow, Kellogg Institute for International Studies and Liu Institute for Asian Studies, all at Notre Dame. Dr. Kim will speak on "The Global Poverty Gap and World Hunger".

After taking a fresh look at the magnitude of global poverty, Dr. Kim's lecture identifies the domestic and global sources of vulnerability facing the poor, and explores the local, national, and global actions needed to end extreme poverty and hunger in the context of social justice.

The lecture is offered as part International Education Week, sponsored by Stockton's Office of Global Engagement, and will be followed by a panel discussion chaired by Dr. Michael Rodriguez, Associate Professor of Political Science and Director of the Washington Internship Program at Stockton University, and featuring Dr. Scott Aughenbaugh, Deputy Director of Strategic Futures at the Center for Strategic and International Studies (CSIS), and Eddie Wright, Communications Specialist for the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA). Hesburgh Lectures, begun in 1986 honor the memory of and perpetuate the example of President Emeritus Rev. Theodore M. Hesburgh, C.S.C., as a lifelong learner. Father Ted died in February at age 97; his remarkable career included 35 years as president of Notre Dame, prominent appointments under several U.S. presidents, and receipt of over 150 honorary degrees and the 2000 Congressional Gold Medal.

12th Annual Fannie Lou Hamer Human and Civil Rights Symposium

The 12th Annual Fannie Lou Hamer Human and Civil Rights Symposium, "Race and Social Justice," will be held on Tuesday, October 6th, 2015 @ 12:30pm in the Stockton Performing Arts Center. Congresswoman Bonnie Watson Coleman will provide the keynote address.

The annual symposium celebrates the life and legacy of civil rights activist Fannie Lou Hamer who dedicated her life to the fight for equality and social justice in America. Mrs. Hamer is remembered for her historic speech at the 1964 Democratic National Convention in Atlantic City, New Jersey, where she helped to focus the nation's attention on the lack of voting right opportunities for African Americans in the State of Mississippi and throughout the southern region.

Bonnie Watson Coleman, a long-time and influential advocate for the people of New Jersey and former Trustee at Stockton, is currently serving her first term in the United States Congress. Prior to her election as Representative for New Jersey's 12th Congressional District, Watson Coleman served eight consecutive terms in the New Jersey General Assembly. She was the first African American woman to serve as Majority Leader of the New Jersey General Assembly, and the first African American woman to serve as the Chair of the New Jersey Democratic State Committee. Her election to the House of Representatives makes her the first African American woman to represent New Jersey in Congress.

Stockton's Fall 2015 International Writer-in-Residence

Michael Mendis, a Sri Lankan fiction writer, will be Stockton's Fall 2015 International Writer-in-Residence. He will arrive on campus November 10 and will be in residence here for three weeks. His reading in ARHU's Visiting Writers Series takes place on Tuesday, November 17, 2015, at 6 PM in the Townsend Residential Life Center (TRLC).

Michael won the Commonwealth Short Story Prize for the Asia region in 2013, while still an undergraduate. His work has been anthologized internationally; his first collection of stories is forthcoming this year. Currently a researcher for the Sri Lanka-based Centre for Policy Alternatives, he is also a social activist on issues of LGBTIQ civil rights, abuse of victims in police custody, and national reconciliation after the Sri Lankan civil war.

His visit is made possible through funding provided by Stockton 2020 and the Bureau

of Educational and Cultural Affairs at the U.S. Department of State. The project is housed in GENS and is a collaborative effort of the Writing and Literature programs, Murphy Writing of Stockton, and the International Writing Program at the University of Iowa.
