I. Executive Summary

Background

The Information Technology and Media Services (ITMS) committee was charged (see the charge in <u>Faculty Senate meeting minutes</u>) by the Stockton University Faculty Executive to explore Learning Management Systems (LMS) alternatives in the Faculty Senate meeting on *December 11th*, *2020*. The objectives for this initiative are exploration of alternate LMS's and assessing faculty satisfaction with existing Blackboard as an LMS. To respond to the charge, the ITMS committee iteratively discussed this important matter during monthly meetings and conducted research to investigate the pros and cons of LMS alternatives. The ITMS after reviewing many LMS products determined that two major LMSs would be most appropriate in meeting the needs at Stockton: Blackboard and Canvas.

To seek faculty input on this important matter, the ITMS committee has conducted literature research; invited faculty representatives **Dr. Heather McGovern** and **Dr. Emari DiGiorgio** gave a demonstration of Canvas to the ITMS committee members; invited Provost **Dr. Kahanov** discussed coordinating the LMS with ADA compliance requirements and enhancing pedagogy and inclusion of quality matters; and analyzed the Blackboard satisfaction survey conducted by the Center for Teaching & Learning Design (CTLD) in 2019 prior to the pandemic) which was reviewed in the **Summary** section.

As one of the major efforts, the ITMS committee collaborated with the CTLD and Information Technology Services (ITS) and held Blackboard and Canvas virtual product demonstration sessions via Zoom on Friday *October 22nd*, *2021 from 4:30 - 6:00pm*. In the session, Blackboard (Ultra) and Canvas vendors demonstrated faculty members' frequently used LMS features/functions based on guidelines provided by the ITMS committee. The Zoom recordings for both sessions were made available after the live session as a webinar with "on-demand" features so faculty members could register to watch the recordings if unable to attend the live session on October 22, 2021.

A Google Form survey was distributed using the "Event Posting" mailing list to the Stockton community to collect faculty members' feedback about the Blackboard (Ultra) and Canvas LMS considering the demo and faculty experiences and needs. This report provides the survey results collected from *October 22nd*, *2021* to *December 11th*, *2021*. A copy of the survey is provided as Appendix A. Survey results are reported in Section V of this report.

Fifty-one faculty members attended at least one of the live product demonstrations on October 22nd. Following the live session, 99 people accessed the Canvas recording and 95 people accessed the Blackboard recordings. Although it is possible that faculty attended the live session and watched recordings, an estimated total of 150 faculty viewed a product demonstration based on Zoom metrics. This represents approximately 21% of eligible faculty (711 full-time and part-time faculty in Fall 2020). Of the 150 faculty who viewed a product demonstration, a total of 59 survey responses were received and an additional 23 faculty respondents who did not view any product demonstration responded to the survey by December 2021. At the conclusion of the survey period, a total of 82 faculty completed the survey (calculated response rate of 82 of 150 =: 54.6%). Note that we consider 82 of 150 (51+99). The 99 assumes 95 for Blackboard are duplicate people who watched both demonstrations.

Survey data was reviewed by the ITMS committee members. Quantitative association analysis (Appendix B) was completed by CTLD Research Fellow, **Christine Tartaro**.

Qualitative thematic analysis for open-ended survey questions (Appendix C) was compiled by **Melanie Schroer** and **Lisa Youngblood**. Background literature research was conducted by **Suya Yin** and is summarized in Section II of this report.

A complete report of data from the survey is provided in Section V of this report. Below is a summary of key findings that guided the recommendations of the ITMS committee.

- Fifty percent of the respondents reported that Canvas is best suited for Stockton students. Blackboard was selected by 19.5% of the respondents as best suited for Stockton Students and 17.1% reported that Blackboard and Canvas were equally beneficial to students with 13.4% of respondents indicating they were unsure if Blackboard or Canvas was better suited to meet Stockton student needs.
- Based on experience and product demonstration, 59.8% of the respondents would like to explore replacing Blackboard with Canvas. 25.6% of the respondents do not want to explore replacing Blackboard with Canvas and 14.6% were unsure.
- Faculty reported a higher rate of familiarity with Blackboard (96%) compared to Canvas (41.5%).
- In response to the statement "I am very comfortable with Blackboard, so I prefer not to have to learn to use a new system like Canvas" 46.3% disagreed with the statement, 26.9% of survey respondents agreed with the statement, and 26.8% were neutral in response to the statement.
- In 2019, the Center for Learning Design (CLD) surveyed faculty and a 72% satisfaction rate with Blackboard was reported. In 2020 with the onset of the pandemic, it was important to reassess faculty satisfaction with Blackboard since use of Blackboard by faculty and students increased during the pandemic. The findings summarized above indicate a faculty preference for Canvas instead of Blackboard.

The following recommendations, reviewed by the Center for Teaching and Learning Design (CTLD) and Information Technology Services (ITS), are provided to Stockton University Faculty Senate Executive committee and campus stakeholders. These recommendations are derived from several sources including the survey data/comments, research conducted by the ITMS committee members, and experiences shared by Stockton University faculty members and discussed by ITMS members during committee meetings.

- 1. Student perceptions of Blackboard and Canvas could be assessed prior to making a final decision regarding LMS adoption or retention. We suggest speaking with the Student Senate to conduct a student survey or focus group to obtain student perspectives.
- 2. This full report should be made available via the Faculty Senate website to the entire Stockton community for additional comment and feedback. Suggest notifying faculty once the document is posted that there is a 30 day comment period with comments being sent to the Faculty Senate ITMS committee Chair (duo.wei@stockton.edu).
- 3. Based on the limitations (i.e. the survey may not capture a full range of expression from the respondents; respondents with biases may select themselves into the sample) of the survey conducted and the large impact of an LMS change on all stakeholders, Stockton University should vote on "consider replacing Blackboard with Canvas" to seek additional faculty input based on faculty and student sandbox (Canvas instance) use and experimentation with Canvas.
- 4. The ITMS committee members recommend that eligible faculty (all faculty who use LMS as their teaching platform, including full-time, part-time, adjunct, non-tenure track, etc.) participate in the voting process for the vote to result in selection of Stockton's LMS and higher participation rate is desired as the selection of an LMS will impact all faculty and students.
- 5. With the guidance of ITS and CTLD, it is recommended that a cohort group of at least 8-12 faculty use the full version of Canvas (ITS can help with buy in full version of Canvas) and as a cohort evaluate Canvas use and provide findings and examples of course development for the campus community working during the Fall 2022 semester. The CTLD will assist in recruiting a faculty cohort, and select a diverse/balanced group of faculty members for this cohort among the volunteers based on their position, rank, experience, ethnicity and gender. In Spring 2023, the cohort using Canvas will work with ITS and CTLD to offer brown bags and formal sessions demonstrating Canvas use. Throughout the Spring 2023 semester, following the sessions presented by cohort members, the campus community will vote to remain with Blackboard or migrate to Canvas.
- 6. CTLD and ITS will come up with a comprehensive plan for the migration process if migration takes place. ITS can assist with setting up a sandbox (Canvas instance) experience for the faculty cohort mentioned in the recommendation above and further investigate the cost, customer support, compliance, resources needed, and timeline for implementation for Canvas to be adopted if student and faculty input from steps above indicate a compelling desire to switch from Blackboard to Canvas.
- 7. If Canvas is determined to be the LMS best suited for Stockton University, faculty and students must be provided with abundant support and training resources to enable skillful use and appropriate transition (migration of content) from Blackboard. It is recommended that ITS and CTLD collaborate to offer support and training.

8. After reviewing the documents and survey data, the ITMS committee recommends that the university should consider migrating to Canvas after the above recommendations have taken place.

II. Overview

Learning Management Systems (LMSs) such as Blackboard and Canvas are at the forefront of recent technological advances in higher education. Blackboard was adopted by Stockton University as the primary LMS for all students (both in person and distance learners) and faculty members in 2008. Due to the outbreak of the COVID-19 pandemic, Blackboard played a significant role in the transition to virtual instruction at Stockton. With the rapid growth in the use of Blackboard at Stockton, it is important to understand how Blackboard has been used, the advantages/disadvantages of Blackboard and its impact on student learning at Stockton. The growth of products in the LMS market since Stockton adopted Blackboard is prolific. Based on a large variety of LMS products, the ITMS committee recognized the value of exploring alternatives and competitors to Blackboard. The following section introduces and discusses the current LMS landscape.

A Learning Management System (LMS) is a software application for the administration, documentation, tracking, reporting, automation and delivery of educational courses, training programs, or learning and development programs. According to Higher Ed Dive [1], Blackboard dominated the Learning Management System (LMS) market, reaching into both the academic and professional sectors. The company provides an online educational interface to millions of users worldwide. That being said, LMS startups are constantly developing new ways to compete and set themselves apart.

A closer look at Blackboard's competitors shows range and diversity. Some companies, such as Moodle and Sakai, provide all-in-one online interfaces similar to Blackboard. Other companies focus on more specific aspects of education. Lore, for example, is a service specifically for course management. To further explore these options, Education Dive has compiled a list briefly summarizing seven LMS companies competing with Blackboard.




Figure 1. LMS Customer Migrations 2017 – 2019 in North America




Figure 2. LMS Market Share For US & Canadian Higher Ed Institutions

In recent years, Canvas has taken a lead in market share. Figure 1 shows the migration of LMSs from 2017 – 2019 [2]. Figure 2 illustrates LMS market share for US and Canadian higher education institutions from 1997 to 2020 [3]. Based on this data and discussions among ITMS committee members and exploration of some of the more frequently used LMS platforms, the ITMS committee determined that Blackboard and Canvas were the two products most likely to meet the overall LMS needs of Stockton University. The committee discussed and understood that some programs/courses may have unique needs that result in the use and selection of another LMS. A University LMS like Blackboard or Canvas would permit faculty teaching in such programs/courses the ability to provide students with a more unified experience even if Blackboard or Canvas is not the primary LMS used to create and distribute content. The committee discussed the importance of considering the student experience and making sure course delivery and materials are accessible as required by law and considered best practice.

III. Learning Management System Use at Stockton

Stockton used WebCT as an LMS as early as the year 2000 and moved to Blackboard by December 31st, 2008. Currently, Stockton uses Blackboard Learn 9.1 as the supportedLMS on campus which offers faculty the ability to create courses in the Original Learn version or in Ultra. Stockton offers both instructors and students on-demand tutorials in the form of videos and documents that demonstrate how to use the most common aspects of the system: https://stockton.edu/blackboard-tutorial/. In Fall of 2020, Stockton offered faculty the option to create courses using Blackboard Ultra and provided additional tutorial resources: (https://stockton.edu/blackboard-tutorial/instructor-tutorials-ultra/index.html).

In 2019, the Center for Learning Design (CLD) conducted a faculty survey with 226 responses to determine overall satisfaction with Blackboard. The summary report by the CLD stated:

"The highest reported uses of Blackboard included: file repository (154 responses), face to face classes (124 responses), hybrid or blended courses (101 responses), and online courses (76). The top 10 Blackboard course elements most frequently used by respondents are: Blackboard Assignments (count: 179), Gradebook (174), Announcements (152), Content Items and Files (147), Discussion Board (117), E-mail (108), Web links (107), Test (93), Course Messages (90), and Turnitin Assignments (65).

Forty-three (19%) of respondents reported using another learning management system (LMS) or tool to make course materials available to Stockton students. Of those reporting use of an alternate LMS system, Canvas was reported by 15 survey participants, Google Classroom (13) and Google Drive (7). Single responses included Odigia, Schoology, Taskstream and publisher options.

Faculty satisfaction with Blackboard is reported at 72% (28% extremely satisfied; 44% somewhat satisfied), 12% report neither satisfied or dissatisfied, and 16% report dissatisfaction (11% somewhat dissatisfied; 5% extremely dissatisfied)."

IV. Faculty Survey on LMS Design

ITMS members iteratively developed and pilot-tested a 26-item survey (Appendix A) with 15 multiple-choice or Likert scale items and 11 open-text response items to gather feedback on Blackboard (Bb) and Canvas based on product demonstrations.. The survey questions were mainly related to the evaluation of Canvas and Blackboard for functionalities/features, overall user experience, and perception and inclination (Table 1, see Appendix 3 for the complete survey).

This survey is designed to collect faculty feedback about the Blackboard and Canvas Learning Management Systems based on product demonstration and faculty experience and needs. If the faculty members did not attend a live Zoom session, it was recommended that faculty review the recorded session(s) before completing the survey.

The survey was distributed to faculty and staff using the "Event Posting" mailing list. The survey was available from *October 22nd*, 2021 to *December 11th*, 2021.


V. Faculty Survey Results

Based on Zoom statistics, 51 faculty members attended the Product Demonstration sessions on October 22nd. Ninety-nine people accessed the Canvas recording with 95 people accessing the Blackboard recording. A total of 82 survey responses were received from Stockton University faculty.

- Sixty-eight survey respondents (83%) responded to a question asking faculty to choose Blackboard or Canvas as the LMS for Stockton. Forty-seven (69%) chose Canvas over Blackboard and 21 respondents (31%) chose Blackboard over Canvas.
- Faculty were asked based on specific LMS features if those features (based on product demonstration or experience) met their teaching needs. Faculty could also respond that they did not use the specific LMS feature. All 82 faculty respondents (100%) completed the LMS feature questions for Blackboard. Fifty-three faculty respondents (64.6%) completed the LMS feature questions for Canvas. The table below indicates that faculty respondents reported that Canvas features were better able to meet their teaching needs.
- In qualitative data assessed, the most prevalent concern over Canvas was the process of switching current course content from Blackboard. It is important to note that in committee conversations, Scott Huston, Chief Information Officer, reported that Stockton would invest in a service as needed to assist faculty with migration of course content to alleviate this concern. Additionally, users of Canvas reported that Blackboard courses import into Canvas without needing significant modifications.





2-4. What is your age range, your school, number of years at Stockton, and current position at Stockton?




6-7. Please indicate your level of competency using Blackboard (a) vs. Canvas (b).




Section III Evaluation of Blackboard vs. Canvas Functionalities/Features

8. Please evaluate the extent to which Blackboard meets your teaching needs for each of the following functionalities/features?




11. Please evaluate the extent to which Canvas meets your teaching needs for each of the following functionalities/features?




18. Based on the demonstrations of Blackboard and Canvas, which learning management system appears best suited for Stockton students?



19. How effective was the product demonstration provided by Blackboard?




20. How effective was the product demonstration provided by Canvas?



A user-friendly interface and ability to share teaching modules easily across institutions

1. Creating tests/question banks is not ideal. The questions are created, but there's no way to group them together, add labels (e.g. add a tag to indicate that this question is from unit 1.3), or color-code the questions. It is difficult to find questions within the larger pool, and I end up using a ton of codes in the Question Title to make sure certain questions group together in the alphabetical list in the pool or test. 2. It would also be helpful to assign particular questions to some students and not others without making a whole new test. 3. Importing question banks or tests from previous semesters is also inconvenient; to my knowledge, the best way to do this without copying a whole course through IT is to export the test/bank, then upload it into the new course. Perhaps the "Content Collection" is supposed to make this easier, but I've never been able to find the content once it's exported to the collection (this could be my ineptitude, but it is frustrating nevertheless). 4. Copying a whole course needs to occur through IT (to my knowledge), and ultimately, changing all the dates and making some content visible/invisible is just as time-consuming as copying individual items myself. On that note, copying individual items (e.g. a file or a weblink/description) from a previous course into a new course requires the instructor to select the course to which the copy will be sent from a dropdown menu. In this list, the courses are simply listed by their titles/ID (e.g. EDUC1100) without a semester/year; perhaps this is something that can be changed from within Stockton rather than a Bb change, but listing the courses according to semester or allowing us to rename the courses for easy

reference would save me SO much time (I've taught the same two courses every semester for years, and finding which course is the current course takes far too much trial and error). 5. While grading assignments, you have to adjust the text size/color and other comment settings with *every *single *paper. Having a mechanism to change the default settings to not use size 18 font or very thick lines would save so much time. Also, the ability to leave video/audio feedback would be more efficient and effective.

More detailed monitoring of students completing specific tasks (e.g., watching videos) I do not like the way the modules are show. Students are not able to distinguish a posted document from an assignment link.

I hate the fact that if I don't add myself to a group, I wont see the assignment in my student view. so double checking assignment is a huge pain. Does Canvas work with Turnitin and do those assignment show on the Calendar? The online grading function is TERRIBLE on Bb, Writing notes to students is clumsy and the page up, page down feature and the way it jumps around makes it unusable.

Discussion thread, particularly for asynchronous coursework, are really difficult to build in Blackboard, as is the ability to build mixed media modules. It technically offers what we need, it just takes 4x as long to build, and 2x as long for the students to find

Better editing tools for papers

Ability to customize the class. Over the years Blackboard has taken away all of these features, now it is a black and white shell. Can't customize buttons or anything. Also would love to copy assignments from one course to another. Want more of a social media feel. Would like to see student profile pics etc.

App doesn't have many features, I can't use it to add content, grade, etc. Students also complain about the lack of notifications after we upgraded to the latest version. The grading inside blackboard does not work well to leave handwritten comments. There is a time lag between the stylus and what appears on the screen and it is very cumbersome to change fonts, color, etc. Blackboard has a lot of legacy code, bloat, and weird setups due to building onto older code over the years and adding in tools they've purchased but didn't quite integrate smoothly.

document sharing

Students need to learn how to access content that is relevant to their assignments. I want Blackboard to offer a feature that suggests or recommends websites/texts that may relate to their assignment. The recommendations may be generated by "key words" that appear in the assignment. Bb is clunky, but it's fine for sharing material, discussions, and grading. Mostly, I know it, and it will take a huge investment of time and energy to learn a different operating system. I don't believe the slight differences from one system to the next would make it worthwhile.

I'm familiar with it.

Students use it for other Stockton classes so it leads to consistency and reduces learning-the-tool time

Of course it is not perfect - but it works and faculty have spent years building their courses on BB. If they really need something different - they do it individually or supplement.

My content already exists in the Blackboard platform and moving it will be a very difficult and time consuming task.

The attendance tool has slightly better features on Blackboard than on Canvas.

The grading isn't as bad as it used to be for papers and adding comments etc.

I've spent countless hours learning how to use Blackboard and building my course materials. I don't know what I like best about it, but I am satisfied with Blackboard.

I tried it in 2008 and didn't use it since then. It was not user friendly like the version at my previous institution. I have since used blogs and now Canvas since Spring 2020. I also used Google Classroom to see what it was like.

The demo seemed great. For example, re-using a course yearly and just clicking a button to update the calendar dates looked so much easier than how I do the same thing currently in BB.

Canvas is less "glitzy" but is far more intuitive and easy to navigate.

I can't answer this, because I don't currently use it. I am open to us switching.

It is pretty and simple to use. It is faster to create an assignment and the community resources are robust.

I have not taught with it.

The user-friendly interface, the ability to link to other course pages, assignments, files, and such when typing out text, the ability to embed media, and the easy steps to re-upload assignments after commenting offline.

User friendly. Very good Speed Grader and it's easy for me to see what has just popped up for me to grade without even opening anything--it's just at the bottom of the home page in blue.

I work with many professors at other institutions in curriculum development and most use Canvas, which allows for better sharing of materials. I also participated in a review of Canvas through the ITMS committee and found it to be intuitive both from the instructor and student side compared to Blackboard.

Very easy to set up a course, navigate the different functionalities, and appearance-wise it is sleek I have used Canvas as a student but not as an instructor so I am not sure.

Easy set and navigation

I don't use Canvas, but from the presentation it looked like it has some of the features I would like to see in a LMS.

its intuitive and is similar to a social media streaming tool

I like that every NJ community college and many local high schools are fluent in Canvas and that it far outweighs the old unattractive Blackboard.

I have not yet used Canvas. I did not find the Canvas instructional session to be helpful in determining whether it would be a better option than Bb.

Dunno. I have spoken to a couple adjunct who have used Canvas and complain that Bb is much harder and lack some functionality that they are used to. See Patti Kunsman's review.

I find Canvas much more intuitive, speedy, convenient, and well-organized. I find the Modules feature and the home pages to be so helpful in keeping my students on track with upcoming assignments. Students have told me they appreciate the calendar and to-do list views. I also like the peer review system and the speedgrader for leaving comments on written work in a no fuss way.

It is intuitive. I know Blackboard stans will argue that there's no such thing as intuitive, (we've had this argument) but at the end of the day, if 99% of students are proficient in using Google Suite and MS Office, things that function more closely to that than whatever 1995 Web CT thing we all once used, it's *is* more intuitive for them and it's time to move on.

Outdated look-and-feel

It requires SO many steps to do everything. The formatting is terrible. I cannot grade papers on my tablet.

I would like control over images associated with objects/tools on learning modules, etc. I would also like to be able to time the e-mails that go out with Announcements. You can't do that in Announcements. You have to send them live.

I find the file upload process "clunky". It would be nice to be able to upload/drag and drop multiple files at once.

Blackboard has all of the minimum tools needed to have a successful LMS but it is kind of clunky in the user interface when it comes to setting things up and just accessing all the information Students don't find it to be intuitive. It has to go down for maintenance. It is not compatible with all browsers, which has led students to fail to see parts of exam questions and miss portions of paper instructions. The mobile app is essentially useless. It is not well integrated across calendars, course syllabi, and announcements. It is drab and basic in appearance, which makes it more difficult to distinguish between classes and functions.

Poor control over rubrics. Some difficulties updating courses.

Dated, not compatible with new technology, grading discussion posts is difficult, does not offer many features that Canvas offers.

Blackboard Learn Ultra could be more user friendly.

I don't have any concerns. Blackboard has served me well for over 10 years.

I don't have any concerns about teaching with BB.

Blackboard is an awkward system with a non-user-friendly interface. It also experiences many technical glitches. It's not intuitive for students or faculty.

Clunky

I wish there was bulk editing of content (like due dates, points, ect.) in Original Blackboard. I know a similar feature is available in Ultra, but Ultra is also not as complete as Original right now.

I'm using Ultra in one of my classes as a test; the "Post" for grades is annoying to have to click every time; and there is no way to make your course landing pages fun; I also find the layout a little confusing with the course and requires a lot of scrolling

Same as earlier answer. Almost everything I need is there, but some of the features are challenging to use.

I find that Blackboard is a bit more "clunky" and doesn't seem to be as user friendly. I sometimes have trouble accessing external content when I'm inside Blackboard. At times I have issues with accessing student assignments and links within them. I haven't yet used Ultra so maybe these would not be concerns with Ultra.

It is very unfriendly in my opinion with a steep learning curve. It is clunky and slow and it takes me 5 minutes just to put a link on blackboard for students to access. The grading system is unnecessarily difficult. I have to go to a specific spot to enter grades unlike canvas where I can grade students under the "Grades" page or under each "Assignment" if I want. Blackboard does not have a feature where students can run "what if" scenarios on their grades but canvas does. Blackboard does not support genuine online discussions in a format that resembles social media with likes and embedded replies.

None. Canvas just seems to be better, but maybe that is because I don't use it.

I do not have concerns with Blackboard per se but rather the lack of instructional design support at Stockton. I have attended Lilly conferences and learned that it is fairly common at other higher ed institutions for instructional designers to full develop Blackboard and Canvas courses for the faculty. Faculty are not trained in IT or instructional design but are expected to master Blackboard and Zoom at Stockton. A parallel is having IT staff and instructional designers teach our courses - they typically do not have the qualifications to do so.

I don't like how Discussion Board works with Blackboard. Additionally, creating exams using Blackboard is tedious and time consuming.

It's hard to use on a phone.

I remember attending an Ultra session over the summer, and there were a few tools available in BB 9 that were not (at least yet) available in Ultra, like randomizing test questions. It looks like that is now available, but we would need to make sure that Stockton has access to that tool.

Seems more and more focused on surveilling students.

I had some issues switching from current BB to new version. My tests did not copy cleanly to the new version so that is why I did not switch this semester.

Blackboard has a much steeper learning curve in my experiences (I've taught using both LMS). The grading feels more tedious overall. It is more difficult to figure out how to create a "Test Student" profile. Students have more trouble locating course materials in Blackboard than on Canvas. Ultra is terrible. Building quizzes is a pain, I can't use my points grading system, it won't let me copy links within a course.

Grading can be a bit cumbersome.

Canvas seems to be a more advanced LMS at this time.

Not online always.

I have one course in Blackboard Ultra this semester and it is not working well for my needs. It freezes all the time, drops settings on assignments, and is difficult to set up in an organized way due to the lack of nested folders.

It takes much longer to do everything, from the student and teacher perspectives. It does not meet the needs of those of us teaching in creative fields or discussion based seminars.

There will be a learning curve when switching to Ultra, but it's not too difficult to figure out. I do wish Ultra didn't eliminate the ability to hide assignments without completely hiding them from the grade book.

It is not always intuitive for students. It has compatibility issues.

The look, better dashboad

Outdated code base makes it hard for Blackboard to really move to a totally updated look and use some of the newer features available in other systems. The app is terrible and basically unusable. System is a bit clunky overall.

Sent emails were not recorded.

Difficult to navigate around. The app version is also difficult to use.

Blackboard can be challenging if it is not consistently used.

Nothing as such.

Blackboard Ultra was designed based on Canvas, and they have been behind the entire time. The gradebook is more streamlined but also more difficult to use (for example, the calculated grade allows for fewer formula options and you can't sort students by the column anymore). The modules are also still pretty static; while they look better and more clean, they function basically the same as the old Learn system, which is clunky.

If we did switch to Canvas, then I would like a 4-credit course release to rebuild my classes. This is likely impossible but is something to consider if people are seriously thinking of changing to Canvas. The total hours that would have to be spent rebuilding courses, learn a new system (for those who done know Canvas), and for students to learn a new system would not be small and should not be ignored. Additionally, for my purposes, Canvas and Blackboard a basically the same. So, I would rather stick with the system in which I already have everything already build than change to a new one.

Moving to Canvas will require a lot of work as I have to rebuild most of my courses again using a new software

I don't really have any concerns about Canvas that I can think of. I think students would like Canvas, but I do have concerns about how well the migration to a new server would go.

Changing platforms. Faculty does not have (nor have we EVER had) sufficient assistance from CLD for course development. The department is seriously lacking in resources to assist faculty at a university of our size. The thought of changing platforms for some courses that have taken years to develop KNOWING that the help/support in the transition won't be available is enough of a reason to strongly argue against the change

I would love to learn Canvas, but learning a new platform is a concern. However, I managed to learn Bb as it changed over the years as I used it long before coming to Stockton. I think I could adapt to Canvas.

I have no concerns about using a new online conferencing platform. However, the learning curve would be tremendous and I believe faculty would be expected to both learn how to use the platform to support pedagogy and also need to learn the mechanics of setting it up. To do so for several courses would be onerous. There would also be a tremendous learning curve for students who are familiar with Blackboard.

My only concern with using Canvas would be the learning curve in again becoming familiar with the tools afforded by the LMS

Currently? That it isn't the Stockton standard, so I don't have access to all of the possible tools in it AND students are learning it plus Blackboard.

Where to start - the amount of time to re-build course and lack of resources that faculty will have to help with this transition.

The time it will take to recreate my Blackboard content in Canvas is time that I don't have. And that significant lost time that will occur if a switch to Canvas takes place is time that I highly doubt that Stockton will be willing to pay for.

My content already exists in the Blackboard platform and moving it will be a very difficult and time consuming task.

No concerns

It is new to me. There will be a learning curve and a lot of time and work to switch.

I'm concerned with re-learning an LMS; this inquiry (should we pursue Canvas) initiated prior to Blackboard Ultra release. I think that any LMS that we use will have strengths and weaknesses. I am not enthusiastic about switching from Blackboard to Canvas due to the time investment needed to gain expertise in the new system.

It would be better if everyone were on Canvas so that students can have a unified experience with Learning Modalities.

There will be a learning curve, but that is also true about moving to Blackboard Ultra Time to learn a new platform.

I am worried about the learning curve of working with a new system and transferring my existing material into Canvas. Canvas seems a bit "flatter," and my Bb resources are all embedded within

folders which are within other folders. I'm not sure how that would translate, although I recognize that we will have support to facilitate this transition.

Adjusting to the transition; View (different organization)

Translating everything I have in Blackboard over to Canvas. It doesn't seem like my materials can easily transfer between the platforms and I cannot imagine having to start all over with 5 years worth of material to move.

Learning curve the first semester using it. As a side note, from the student perspective, we need ONE learning management system as I have several students that are not doing well because one faculty member is using Blackboard, another Canvas, and even one that operates their entire class via email! The students are confused and frustrated. We need one universal system so the faculty and the students can become comfortable using it.

I HATE the messaging system in Canvas - much easier with Blackboard. Also speed grader on Canvas is not as user friendly as "needs grading" on Blackboard.

moving all of my materials to a new platform will add a lot of busy-work to my work load. I am not opposed to changing to Canvas if that is what the consensus is, however, my greatest concern is support to learn a new LMS and the time to import/change to meet Canvas' required format. I would hope there would be a gradual migration of files and gradual phasing out of Blackboard before we fully embrace Canvas.

Again, the workload required to shift to a new LMS. I am willing to sink the time if it is a better experience for grading.

It is not as technical on the back end, there isn't enough deep diving

None it's plug and play

Difficult to know at this point.

I don't know what I don't know. If it truly is easier to use and has better syllabus, grading, and calendars, I WANT TO TRY IT.

None. I strongly prefer Canvas.

A steeper learning curve, however I feel as though more universities and colleges use Canvas than Blackboard so it would assist our transfer students.

There seems to be less freedom to set things up the way you want to.

I think it's important to identify what Stockton is examining: Ultra vs. Canvas, not Blackboard vs Canvas. Blackboard because of my familiarity with it, but also because of the way I have my courses set up already. Everything is in folders.

I would choose Canvas for Stockton, it is a lot more user friendly than Blackboard and has more tool options.

I would choose Canvas — I think it will provide a better, more intuitive, and more seamless student experience, especially as more and more faculty become comfortable supporting their courses with an LMS.

While I am already heavily invested in Blackboard, it seems that Canvas may have advantages. Canvas. Easy to use, technologically advanced, compatible with publisher's website, better discussion board feature, enables file sharing in a more convenient way, has a language feature that translates everything on the page to a different language.

Canvas is a better choice for IT support, for the faculty and for the students.

Blackboard. All course material is already on Blackboard. Additionally, the usability of Blackboard is very intuitive, whereas Canvas is not. Canvas has a steep learning curve.

I wish the answer were simple, but Blackboard and Canvas' full potential depends on every faculty member utilizing the platforms. If assignments aren't created in Canvas or Blackboard, students

won't receive any notifications or have a helpful calendar to reference. The idea of collecting ELO alignment data sounds great too, but if no one creates their assignment in the LMS, there will be very limited data to collect.

I'm conflicted. Canvas looks really cool but it would be a learning-curve.

Canvas. I've explained why the question asking me what I like about Canvas.

Blackboard - it meets my needs

CANVAS, hands down. So easy on the professor and students sides both. So many functions, plus it will translate into multiple languages for our students. I have a student this semester who could really use that, but we don't have Canvas so they are struggling to translate everything. Blackboard, as I already have my entire course presence built in this system. Changing to Canvas would only generate nonproductive work and would add little to no improvement over Blackboard. Canvas appears to be very user friendly and also more like a webpage than Blackboard; it also appears that there are easier ways to navigate to find things or update your course content...love the drag and drop on the calendar feature

Canvas. Easy of use for staudents and faculty and additional features available.

I would choose Canvas. It seemed easier/better features judging by the demo. I asked a couple of people who have used it and they said Canvas is intuitive and easy to learn.

I would choose Blackboard as many colleagues have many developed courses on it and migrating these courses Canvas will be a major hurdle.

I'm really not sure. I am apprehensive about switching classroom servers due to concerns about migration. However, in the past I have found Blackboard to be very "clunky" and I had hoped we would switch to Canvas. It seems that Bb Ultra may be a better tool and I would like to explore this more. Ultra appears as though it may be less "clunky" so I look forward to using it and getting acclimated. I don't exactly know how to switch to Ultra, but I plan to try to learn to do so. Canvas for sure. Blackboard is outdated in its appearance and in terms of friendliness. Canvas is super easy to navigate and has a Calendar and To Do list which helps students and me stay organized. It's hard to organize assignments in blackboard. I have to go into each assignment, I have to manually edit it. But in canvas, I can drag and drop things very easily to change due dates and locations of assignments. It is very easy to manipulate and navigate content on canvas which saves me a lot of time.

Canvas just seems to have more to offer for all the reasons already stated.

Blackboard - for the reasons cited in my responses to prior questions.

As I mentioned, Ultra Blackboard is far more glitzy than the previous version as well as compared with Canvas. Canvas seems to offer far more productivity. The ease of moving due dates and populating those changes throughout one's course would be wonderful.

Bb – I am path dependent, and the differences are insufficient to warrant additional investment to learn Canvas.

Canvas-I've already switched away from Blackboard because I find Canvas simpler to use and appreciate the community resources.

Blackboard - or Stockton can pay to have both and let instructors pick which one. To think that current faculty have the time, resources and desire to change all their courses is a bit concerning. Blackboard. The question above on "comfort" and "learning" is a loaded question. I actually wanted to leave that question blank for this reason, but it is marked as "required." It is not an issue of "comfort" and also not an issue of "learning", but the matter of time. I, like many others, teach several courses, all of which would need to be transitioned to a new system if a switch takes place. Nobody is going to compensate any faculty for this extra time. It would also be false to argue that it is part of regular course prep. Regular course prep does not require reformatting, etc all course content, and dealing with other issues that will likely come up. There is an old saying, "if it isn't broke, don't fix it." Blackboard is not broken. So stop trying to fix a problem that doesn't exist. You will only create a far worse problem.

Unsure. I will learn Canvas if Stockton switches. I feel like it was difficult to evaluate the differences between the 2 systems just based on the demonstrations but Canvas seemed to have some features that were easier to use than BB. I mainly teach face to face courses and use the LMS for recorded PP, videos, discussion boards and grading. I feel either system would meet my needs. Blackboard- It's widely adopted and utilized, content already exists in the platform, and integrations are already in place.

I would choose Canvas because it makes students' and instructors' lives much simpler.

Canvas-If people aren't using Blackboard Ultra yet they don't know the learning curve that is involved with that. If we are going to have to move to Ultra, may as well move to something that isn't that terrible

Again, Canvas seems to be a more advanced tool, many more options than Blackboard Canvas due to its wider user base, better interface, and more responsive customer service Faculty and students have been through a lot of change. Blackboard does the job and the students know how to use it.

Although it will take some time to learn a new system and work out all the kinks from transferring my existing content to Canvas, I would like to use Canvas in the future. Canvas seems to have solutions for all of my problems with Blackboard, and it has additional useful features that I would utilize in my courses.

It looks like Canvas has more features. My only concern is access to old courses

I would choose Canvas. It is a newer system with more up to date features for faculty, but especially for students. I have used Blackboard, Moodle, and D2L and would prefer to move to Canvas.

25. Optional Additional Comments: Please provide any additional information related to the use of Blackboard or Canvas, this survey, or the product demonstration:

Maybe more feature demonstration sessions should be offered in the future.

Just consider the familiarity of faculty with Blackboard. Covid pushed many to learn to use it and to change now MIGHT be difficult for some.

Some functions of Blackboard have gotten annoyingly slow. For example, the program response lag when creating exams and individual exam questions used to be instantaneous. For the past couple of years, I have to wait a few seconds after selecting an option before the operation is completed. There are many other examples of Blackboard leaving me waiting to accomplish operations that something like Google Classroom completes instantly. From the demonstration, Canvas seems to be snappy and quick, too, which will be much less frustrating while I'm building courses and creating course content.

The Canvas demo has shown that their LMS is superior to Blackboard.

The collaboration features of both platforms depend on how an organization uses an LMS. For instance, Blackboard could be a fantastic resource for Stockton students to see all their assignments in a single place with a nice calendar view. However, few face-to-face classes use Blackboard, making it difficult for students to get accurate notifications or reminders. Unless all courses utilize an LMS platform, it will never be as valuable as what's shown in the product demonstrations.

While I certainly appreciate this effort, this survey seems to be biased towards Blackboard. In the future, it might be beneficial to utilize a more objective survey design. Please switch to Canvas!

This survey is obviously biased towards people wanting to change from Blackboard to Canvas (question phrasing, etc.). That bias will need to be taken into consideration when analyzing these results. For example, all users of Blackboard should feel comfortable taking this survey. The way it is currently written makes it feel like respondents must be familiar with both systems to give responses. This should not be the case as a change from Blackboard to Canvas would impact all Blackboard users. I am not sure the results from the survey are going to be representative of Blackboard users on campus. Additionally, whether the product demonstrations were helpful or not is meaningless and should not be in the survey. The Stockton Help Desk has tons of tutorials that are very helpful, so the effectiveness of the product demos holds no value to the intent of the survey. I've been an adjunct with Stockton for 10 years and now a NTTP, and am very comfortable with Blackboard, and not afraid of technology. Some of my fellow newbies in the New Faculty Workshop have used Canvas at other institutions and have said they found it much easier than Blackboard. From what I hear and saw on the Zoom I think it's worth exploring.

I hope there is a way to retain/view old BB courses, if we switch. I often go back and review grades/assignments when students ask for recommendation letters.

Thank you for the opportunity to learn more about these classroom servers. I look forward to learning more about them.

Students have told me that they really enjoy canvas because of the calendar, to do list, and what if scenarios for their grades. It would be much easier if we transitioned to canvas because then students would not need to "sign up" for my canvas site.

As stated previously. Changing platforms for courses that have taken years to develop without sufficient CLD resources, is irresponsible. CDL needs to grow and become more equipped to assist faculty before such a major change can occur.

Again, BB is by no means perfect - no system is. However, for faculty that are stretched to their limits with teaching, service and research - and coming off 18 months of COVID. Asking them to learn and change to a new format seems a pretty big "ASK".

Can we have some context about why we are considering switching this now? Although the narrative is that we are post-pandemic, we are not. This is relevant because faculty and students are facing unprecedented rates of burnout. Adding another thing to do/to learn/to adapt to right now doesn't seem healthy. Can we wait to discuss this until next year?

It took me a very long time to create my existing course content in Blackboard. It's something that I'm passionate about and I've spent the last seven years developing in the Blackboard platform. I am concerned that my course content will not gracefully transition from the Blackboard platform to the Canvas platform and I will be left re-creating my old course content, instead of focusing on integrating new content.

I've used Google Classroom before and prefer it to Blackboard Ultra, but students did not like having to go to a different site for only my class so I stopped.

Thanks for putting together the demos

Thank you for these excellent demonstrations!

Please see my comment in one of the prior questions. The key is to select ONE learning system and make everyone use it. The students are getting very frustrated and are not doing well with us using different learning systems - especially for classes that are totally online and when the instructor cannot walk students through the platform. Canvas appeared to be much more integrated across the board and have more bells and whistles - more flexibility - which is preferred.

Canvas is way more convenient based on my experience

As someone fluent in Canvas I can assure you with very minimal training Canvas will be a hit with veteran Blackboard users.

The presenter in Canvas spent more time saying how wonderful it is and "so many things you can do" instead of showing us so many things we can do. He may have been on Prozac. I trust you guys. If Canvas is truly better lets go for it. If its Eh? than it may not be worth the learning curve.

Faculty Survey on Learning Management System (LMS)

It's tough to gauge from one brief product assessment, but I felt as though Canvas had some stronger features than Blackboard. Additionally, the apps that it has could resonate more with the students who want to use it on different devices. I'm not sure how many classes are already taught in Ultra for students to benefit from the experience but the lack of a Blackboard app has presented challenges in the past. One particular example involved a student not being able to enter fill-in-the-blank information on a quiz she was taking from her phone as opposed to being on a computer. NONE

The conversion process would be key to my feelings about whether or not to chose to move to canvas. If I can't access old material, I would rather not make the move.

I'd explore if Canvas is significantly cheaper.

If switch to canvas, should allow faculty to migrate all the courses to canvas.

I used Canvas at my previous institution (3 years ago). I haven't used it since then so I'm not aware of its current disadvantages. I think we should also ask students about their current experience with BB.

The product demonstrations were really good and informative.

The relatively low rate of BB utilization pre-COVID is one strong indicator about whether this system met institutional needs.

VII. Additional Discussions Supporting Report Recommendations

Discussions

The Learning Management Systems (LMS) faculty survey project collected 82 responses from faculty members from October through December 2021. Data from the survey was reviewed and discussed during several ITMS committee meetings. The results of this discussion and raw survey data are provided in this report.

a. Faculty Using Canvas & Survey Comments about Canvas

The ITMS committee invited two faculty members who currently use Canvas in Stockton courses to present to the committee members during the month year meeting. Faculty member explained that Canvas has a better interface (more modern look) and a better mobile application compared to Blackboard. The faculty report being able to design more attractive looking courses that are easier for students to navigate.

The Canvas calendar and intuitive controls for students were viewed positively by faculty who described use of Canvas in the survey. Half of faculty reported that Canvas might be better suited to Stockton student needs. Faculty using Canvas reported higher average scores indicating that Canvas features meet their teaching needs at a higher level than scores given by faculty using Blackboard..

b. Faculty Survey Comments About Blackboard

Faculty perceptions from the survey were discussed by the ITMS committee and it was noted that some of the criticisms of Blackboard are based on faculty not being aware of features available in Blackboard such as moving bulk content, course copy, translation into other languages, video uses and more. The committee discussed that it may be helpful for ITS and/or CTLD to provide more training on Blackboard and make faculty more aware of Blackboard features.

It was also noted that most faculty (96.3%) indicated proficiency with Blackboard. Faculty preferring to remain with Blackboard expressed a primary concern was not having to learn how to use a new LMS (26.9% agree, 46.3% disagree, and 26.8% were neutral). Some faculty responses indicated a high level of burnout/fatigue from COVID, concern about the time involved in switching from Blackboard, and concern about support in migrating content to a new system.

c. Other Committee Discussions

Interestingly, one qualitative survey response focused on how Canvas would offer a "unified" experience for students. However, committee members discussed some potential issues with a mandated unified LMS discussing how some programs (i.e., Education) and individual faculty members use Google classroom or publisher LMSs to best meet identified student learning

needs. The committee discussed the many benefits to students having one official University LMS. Some students currently taking five classes will find empty Blackboard shells and need to learn to navigate five different "LMS" experiences. There is some discussion occurring on campus about the ways multiple LMS use may disadvantage certain students and how to balance this with faculty and program needs as well as training and support needs.

Additional Considerations

Some of the major institutions in New Jersey including both research institutions (i.e. Princeton University, New Jersey Institute of Technology) and teaching institutions (i.e. The College of New Jersey, Rowan University, Montclair State University) have migrated to Canvas as the primary learning management system.

The ITMS committee members suggest that the University should provide faculty with support to explore the use of Canvas (sandbox experience) to determine if the Canvas experience is superior to Blackboard. Based on a sufficient period of experimental use, the faculty should be polled to determine interest in migrating to Canvas (timeline for these activities is best determined by ITS in collaboration with CTLD). If Canvas is selected by faculty majority with at least 30% of eligible faculty participating in the polling activity, ITS will work with vendors to implement Canvas as the University LMS. ITS and CTLD will provide training and tutorials for faculty, staff and students.

The ITMS committee recognizes the limitation of asking faculty in a survey what is best for students. It was discussed and recommended that the University conduct a survey of the students to determine if there is a strong preference for Canvas over Blackboard. Conducting a survey to the students will reduce the bias present in the faculty survey data.

The ITMS members suggest that this full report should be shared with the Stockton community with a thirty day comment period where faculty may share comments based on the report and recommendations.

The ITMS committee members recognize that ITS will need to take the lead to investigate the cost, customer support, compliance, resources needed, and timeline for implementation if Canvas were to be adopted based on a compelling desire to switch from Blackboard to Canvas.

Limitation of the Survey

There are limitations of the current faculty survey. For example, faculty who could not watch both demonstrations may not have completed the survey, even though they may have opinions on the LMS usage. The survey may not capture a full range of expression from the faculty members. Respondents with biases may select themselves into the sample.
