- Jill Gerhardt, Associate Professor, Computer Science and Information Systems, Michael Cronin, Assistant Professor, Social Work and MaryAnn Trail, Public Services Librarian/Associate Professor in the Library – "Just do it Online" – Presentation of improved student performance when classroom and library materials are made accessible online.
- Mary Lou Galantino, Professor, Physical Therapy "Longitudinal Benefits of Wellness Coaching Interventions for Cancer Survivors" – Presentation on the positive results of using various forms of coaching in health care.
- Lisa Rosner, Professor of History "Workshop on Oral History Grab your Recorders and Come as you Are" – A hands-on workshop for anyone interested in starting an oral history project.
- Mark Mallet, Assistant Professor, Theatre Arts, Arnaldo Cordero-Roman, Associate Professor of Spanish – The final act of "Pedro and the Captain" by Mario Benedetti – Faculty and student reading of the first English translation of this Uruquayan author.
