



## Stockton, Atlantic Cape Community College Sign Dual Admission Agreement

Students Would Save Money, Transfer More Easily

**Galloway, NJ** - Stockton University and Atlantic Cape Community College today signed a conditional dual admission agreement that will enable students from Atlantic or Cape May counties to earn their associate degrees at Atlantic Cape and then easily transition to Stockton to complete their undergraduate education.

A student from either of the two counties who is denied admission to Stockton University directly out of high school would be offered conditional admission as a transfer student to Stockton from Atlantic Cape, under the program. The application fee for Stockton will be waived for eligible students.

"This agreement will benefit students by reducing the cost of their education," said Stockton Interim President Harvey Kesselman. "Stockton University and Atlantic Cape Community College are passionate about providing cost-effective paths for students to earn their degrees, which prepare them for the jobs of today and tomorrow and lead to more successful lives."

Admission to Stockton would be contingent upon: successful completion of the A.A., A.S., or A.A.S. degree at Atlantic Cape, having maintained a 2.5 or better cumulative grade point average at Atlantic Cape in all courses. Students also would have to achieve a grade of "C" or better in those courses preparing them for their major at Stockton.

"Atlantic Cape is excited about the opportunity to expand our partnership with Stockton University and provide local residents another cost-effective pathway to a baccalaureate degree," said Dr. Peter L. Mora, Atlantic Cape president. "Developing partnerships like this will make our community stronger and lead to more highly skilled graduates to support our local workforce."

Students seeking to enter the program must complete an application and a waiver form allowing Atlantic Cape to share academic records with Stockton. Students would indicate their intention to progress to Stockton no later than July 1 for a fall semester start or Dec. 1 for a spring semester start.

Eligible students who register for conditional dual admission will be assigned a Stockton University Academic Adviser in the Center for Academic Advising.

Students completing an A.A.S. degree from Atlantic Cape may be required to take more than 128 credits dependent upon the program they choose at Stockton University.

The agreement is for a term of five years and would be reviewed during its fourth year, with extensions presumed to be approved.
