## Richard Stockton College of NJ Receives Training Grants of Nearly \$500,000

## College's New School of Graduate and Continuing Studies to Extend Training for Region's Casino Workforce

In addition to the Resorts and Hilton, The Stockton Institute for Gaming Management has provided training services for Trump Entertainment, the Borgata Hotel Casino and Spa, Harrah's, Bally's, Caesar's and the Sands.

Dr. Lewis Leitner, Director of the Gaming Management Institute said, "Together, the two Department of Labor awards will enhance the skills of thousands more employees in Atlantic City, helping to make this region a superior destination for its 36 million annual visitors."
