Galloway Township, NJ - Go Global!, a collaborative effort by The Richard Stockton College of New Jersey and Rowan University, will offer first-time students who are entering the colleges this fall a free online course this summer.

Go Global! will focus on global issues from a variety of perspectives and will explore important trends that have the potential to transform the way students live and interact with others, said Dr. Susan Davenport, vice provost of E-Learning at Stockton.

The course, which starts July 1, will be taught by faculty at Stockton and Rowan and will count toward the students' college requirements.

"We are excited to partner with Rowan to provide this unique opportunity to students in Southern New Jersey," said Dr. Harvey Kesselman, Stockton's provost and executive vice president. "Knowledge of global issues is essential for every career path, and this course is a great first step for our future students and leaders. We are proud to offer this free course because we know how important it is to help students and their families reduce the cost of education. Stockton and Rowan are committed to providing innovative solutions."

The American Association of State Colleges and Universities (AASCU) course was developed by faculty from across the United States.

A limited number of students who are enrolled as freshmen in Stockton this fall have been invited to participate and course is filled, Dr. Davenport said. Rowan University is currently accepting registration for its course.

"The future of higher education will require that institutions partner on initiatives like this as a means of keeping costs down while delivering high-quality educational options for our students.
