Galloway Township, NJ - Stockton University's Kramer Hall in Hammonton will host "A Trip to Mars" as part of the Hammonton Third Thursday theme, "Bellevue Empire," at the instructional site on **Thursday, Sept. 17.** The event celebrates the "Bellevue Empire" through the launch of the publication of "A Trip to Mars," a previously unknown book authored by Charles K. Landis, founder of Vineland and Sea Isle City.

The event will be held from 6 - 8 p.m. at Kramer Hall, 30 Front St. in downtown Hammonton, NJ as part of the town's monthly Third Thursday events. Light refreshments will be served at this free public event.

The first commercially successful typewriter was patented in America in 1868. Less than a decade later, Landis, who founded Vineland in 1861 and Sea Isle City in 1882, used the typewriter to write his previously unpublished Sci-Fi novel, "A Trip to Mars."

The manuscript went unrecognized for many decades in the vault of the Vineland Historical & Antiquarian Society. Now, in a joint effort between the Vineland Historical & Antiquarian Society and Stockton's South Jersey Culture and History Center, it has been published in paperback.

The event will include an introduction by Patricia A. Martinelli, curator of the Vineland Historical and Antiquarian Society, and comments by Tom Kinsella, director of the South Jersey Culture and History Center.
