

Stockton's Speech and Hearing Club Presents Voice Symposium for Professional Development

3.75 Continuing Education Credits Available for Professionals

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Galloway, NJ – Stockton University will host a "Bridging the Glottal Gap: A Voice Symposium" on **Saturday, Oct. 3 from 9 a.m. to 1:30 p.m.** in Alton Auditorium on the main Galloway campus. Amy Hadley, associate professor of Communication Disorders at Stockton, is organizing the event with students in the Speech and Hearing Club. The continuing education course will provide professional development to professionals and students with an interest in voice disorders.

Presenters include: Elizabeth U. Grillo of West Chester University; Shari Salzhauer Berkowitz of Mercer College; and Bridget Rose of Philadelphia Ear, Nose and Throat Associates.

Topics addressed will explore the Global Voice Therapy Model (GVTM), an evidence-based global voice therapy model developed by Grillo.

The model looks at professional care of voice singers in clinical practice. Participants will gain insight on collaborating with voice practitioners around the world, and a personal account of being afflicted with vocal pathology.

Anthony Talmich, a consultant for Griffin Laboratories, the makers of the TrueTone Electrolarynx, will give the keynote address.

The Voice Symposium is free for students, and \$25 for professionals. The course will offer 3.75 continuing education credits for professionals.
