#### Congress Passes \$2 Trillion in COVID-19 Aid, Including Research Support - GrantWeek by Wellons, Richard N.

The \$2 trillion CARES Act was signed into law on March 27, the third (and largest) legislative package passed in response to the COVID-19 epidemic. Aside from dispensing cash payments to individuals, the legislation provides aid to shore up affected U.S. health and economic sectors - this includes \$14 billion in relief for colleges and universities and \$340 billion in emergency supplemental appropriations. As reported in the American Institute of Physics' FYI publication, among the emergency appropriations related to research are the following:

\$945 million for the National Institutes of Health, of which \$706 million is for the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases; \$103 million for the National Heart, Lung, and Blood Institute; \$60 million for the National Institute of Biomedical Imaging and Bioengineering; \$36 million for the National Center for Advancing Translational Sciences; \$30 million for the Office of the Director; and \$10 million for the National Library of Medicine; \$415 million for the U.S. Department of Defense's health R&D activities, including development of vaccines, anti-viral drugs, and diagnostic tests; \$99.5 million for the U.S. Department of Energy; \$76 million to the National Science Foundation; and \$66 million for the National Institute of Standards and Technology.

A full summary of the emergency supplemental appropriations is available at the Senate Appropriations Committee website or, directly, here. An earlier bill provided \$7.76 billion in supplemental appropriations for federal, state and local agencies.
